## Millennial Conservation: How Today's Youth Will Shape Tomorrow's Conservation

(Cartagena, Colombia 20 July 2017) - The International Fund for Animal Welfare (IFAW) is hosting a workshop at the 2017 International Congress for Conservation Biology (#ICCB2017) to look at the challenges and opportunities facing millennial conservationists and the unique strategies they are utilizing to shape the future of conservation. The workshop will be held on Tuesday, July 25<sup>th</sup> at the Cartagena Convention Center, Colombia.

Young conservationists around the globe are leading a new conservation movement. With the hashtag #YouthVoices4Nature IFAW is inviting participants and people worldwide, to promote the inclusion of a broader diversity of millennial-aged youth in conservation research, practice, advocacy, and management. Further inclusion of youth of diverse backgrounds offers unique opportunities to bridge cultural barriers, harness non-traditional ways of communication, mobilize new creativity for positive conservation outcomes, and advance conservation's knowledge-base.

Millennials are known to be creative and atypical thinkers, relying on their own sense of knowledge and gathered experiences to harness new, inventive ideas when traditional ones are lacking impact. They bring a fresh, unfiltered perspective to conservation challenges and identify a combination of trusted and future-thinking solutions to problems. The International Fund for Animal Welfare (IFAW) has supported young conservationists across the globe through a variety of leadership building programs, such as the Conservation Leadership in the Caribbean (CLiC) and the Emerging Wildlife Conservation Leaders (EWCL). It has also partnered with youth driven organizations such as the Global Youth Biodiversity Network and Youth for Wildlife Conservation to foster their goals of building youth capacity to drive forward conservation science and advocacy.
