ECS 302 / GEG 545 Perspectives on Environmental Decisions

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Course overview and objectives:

ECS 302 (GEG 545) introduces the student to conceptual frameworks and methodological tools commonly used in environmental decisions, from a critical perspective. Current environmental problems typically have both natural and human causes and consequences. There is a growing consensus among the science and policy communities that our understanding and solutions to these problems must therefore integrate insights from the natural as well as social sciences. The first part of this course focuses on key concepts, frameworks and perspectives in the social sciences that have direct bearing on environmental problems. Equipped with these critical perspectives, we will initiate the second part of the course, learning about and evaluating from the human perspective some fundamental issues in environmental management.

The following topics will be covered during the semester:

- Property regimes
- Environment and development
- Protected area management
- Green revolution and biotechnologies
- Global environmental change, climate and human health
- Vulnerability and risk perception
- Equity and ethics and participatory decision-making
